

WINTER ROOST

he winter roost gives the titmouse, chickadee and nuthatch a place out of the elements. By day these birds grace our winter feeders and seek shelter at night. For that reason, the entrance should face east and south, away from prevailing winds. The roost should be placed where it is exposed to maximum sunlight and minimum wind.
