## VOODWORKING FOR WILDL CAROLINA WREN NEST BO

he Carolina wren is one of our most common and enjoyable songbirds. Its beautiful bubbling calls are a joy to hear during the summer. Carolina wren nest boxes are most likely to be used if they are 5 to 10 feet above the ground and located under the eave of a building or in a tree. Wren boxes and gourds for purple martins are the only kind of bird house which can be free-hanging from an eye-screw. All other bird houses need to be firmly anchored.

Don't put a perch on the nest box. Perches invite sparrows to try using the nest. If you have a perch on a wren house, take it off. The entrance hole for a wren house should be 1 inch in diameter. Carolina wren holes are too small for house sparrows and European starlings to use.

As soon as one family of wrens leaves a house, clean it out so another brood of young can be raised.
